on at Clover Street to keep you all entertained and warm (our aging heating system, permitting).


The main event this month is of course our Charity Lunch on the 9th (more info below); the first in our series of special events for 2019.

Buckley Hill Lane in days gone by ...

Disappointingly our walk between Christmas and Year had to be cut short due to poor weather so we only completed half the figure of eight at Birtle. As this edition of the Messenger was going to press we were due to walk round the edge of Kingsway Business Park from Buckley Hill Lane, Milnrow with refreshments half way round at the Spring Inn, Broad Lane. Due to various Church commitments and holidays the next. walk will be on 2nd March when we will be having a local walk around the Greenbooth and Naden reservoirs.

POOK CIRCLE



The next meeting of the Book Circle is on 4th February when we will be discussing The Girl who Fell from the Sky by Simon Mawer. We read this thriller a few years ago but all agreed it was worth reading again, particularly for the benefit of our new members. This is the Forward: The French section of the Special Operations Executive sent 39 women into the field between May 1941 and September 1944. Of these, 12 were murdered following their capture by the Germans, while one other died of meningitis during her mission. The remainder survived the war. Some of these women became well know to the public through films and books that were written about them. Others remained, and remain, obscure. They were all remarkable. The Girl who fell from the Sky is about a young half English, half French woman who joins the Special Operations Executive (SOE) in 1943 and, after extensive training, is parachuted into occupied France. But as she learns more about the risky operation her superiors have in mind for her, she begins to suspect that it may be a more personal connection that singled her out for this dangerous mission.

THE DIVINE RAILWAY

What follows is an extract from a reading given by worship leader Graeme Pilbrough. It was written by his step father Keith Rothwell, who has given permission for it to be published in the Messenger.

The origins of the railway are lost in the mists of time, myths and legends are the only hints at its origin and age. We know that it is a worldwide network. The major lines are the Christian Line, the Buddhist Network, the Muslim Connection, all with many branch and feeder lines. There are the very ancient lines of the Aborigines, and the natives of New Guinea, or the Amazon.

All these lines have many stations. People start their life journey at a station which may be far from the terminus, or near, whichever may be appropriate

to the circumstances of their birth. Some take the slow train and move only a few stations along, others take a faster train and try to get as far as possible, others go too fast, and derail themselves. Some break



their journey and are afraid to go on, some find the station buffet too comfortable, and decide not to go on, and others even try to go back the way they came. Some people switch from the slow train to fast, others even switch from one line to another which suits them better.

Some passengers hog the Buffet Car,

monopolising the space, and storing up huge quantities of sandwiches and drinks and so depriving their



fellow passengers. They do this despite a clear warning that they can take nothing with them when they leave the train. The Company maintains a large staff on each train to assist and advise passengers. Unfortunately, most passengers fail to recognise or even see them.

The most important elements in the system are the passengers. The system exists to help the individual passengers travel as far as they are able and make the journey as comfortable as possible. Various passenger associations have been set up over the centuries to help passengers on their journey. On the Christian line, these are known as churches.

The Christian line is an offshoot from the older

Jewish line and both these have re-laid part of their track over the Ancient Egyptian and Persian lines. Soon after the Christian line was inaugurated, there emerged two Passenger Associations whose descendants are known as the Roman Catholic and the Greek Orthodox Churches. Now there are many different passenger associations, all claiming to have more contact with the Board of Management, to get advance notice of their timetable changes, or more comfortable carriages for their members.

Most of the Associations have longstanding rules, formulated during the early days of the Christian Line. Although these rules were necessary in the early days, some of them have become unrealistic, or irrelevant, as conditions and the state of the passengers' consciousness have developed. Many travellers have become disenchanted with the squabbling between the different associations, and taken responsibility for their own travel plans, either alone or in informal groups.

Now that you know you are a passenger, take responsibility for your journey. Decide the correct speed for YOU to travel at. Join a church if it will help you but do not give them control of your journey. The responsibility will always be yours. Look out of the carriage window and enjoy the changing scenery of the journey and when the train enters a dark tunnel, as it will from time to time, remember it must eventually emerge back into the daylight. If illness or adversity slow you down or force you to break your journey, accept it, rest and recuperate. Perhaps you need to try a different direction, or maybe you were going too fast.

From time to time you will run into the buffers of a dead end. Do not regret or resent this, retrace your steps and re-join the main line. The experience you gain from these journeys will always prove useful and essential later on. To find the right line, it is very often necessary to first take several wrong ones.

Enjoy the company of your fellow passengers whilst they are with you. No-one can predict when their journey may end. They may have to change carriages, or get off at a station. Do not look back with regret at the stations, or the passengers you have left behind. Appreciate and acknowledge your present companions.
